

## ABOUT THE AUTHORS\*

**Ekaterina STEPANOVA** heads Peace and Conflict Studies Unit and is a lead researcher at Primakov National Research Institute of the World Economy & International Relations (IMEMO), Moscow. Her research focus is on armed conflicts, insurgencies, terrorism, human security, peace-building, and the political economy of conflicts. She authored 190 publications in 10 languages that include monographs on civil-military relations in peace support and humanitarian operations and on violence against civilians *Civil-Military Relations in Operations Other Than War*, Moscow, 2001) and *Terrorism in Asymmetrical Conflict: Ideological and Structural Aspects* (Oxford University Press, 2008), a chapter on Russia in *The Oxford Handbook on the Responsibility to Protect* (2016) etc. She edits the IMEMO journal “Pathways to Peace and Security” and serves on editorial boards of journals “Responsibility to Protect”, “Global Governance” and “Terrorism and Political Violence”. Prof. Stepanova teaches at the International Programs at MGIMO-University and at Public Policy School of the Russian Academy of National Economy & Public Administration (RANEPA). She is a member of the Global Peace Index expert panel, the International Panel of Social Progress, the Joint U.S.-Russia Expert Group on Afghanistan etc. She is a graduate of, and holds a PhD from, Moscow State University and holds a Dr.Sc. (Dr.Habil.) degree in Political Science from IMEMO. In 2007–2009, she led the Armed conflicts and conflict management program at Stockholm International Peace Research Institute (SIPRI).

**Bakhtiyar TUZMUKHAMEDOV** is Professor of International Law, Distinguished Lawyer of the Russian Federation, and Vice-President, Russian Association of International Law. He also current serves a term (2018-2021) at the Committee Against Torture, as one of the Committee's 10 independent experts. He is a graduate of Moscow State Institute of International Relations (MGIMO) and Harvard Law School. In 1992–2016 he was a senior staff member at the Constitutional Court of the Russian Federation. In 2012–2015, he served as an Appeals Chamber judge at the UN International Criminal Tribunals for Rwanda and the former Yugoslavia. In 2009-2012 he was a trial judge at the UN International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda. He also served as adviser of Russia's delegations to the UN Special Committee on Peacekeeping Operations, Civil Affairs Officer at UNPROFOR in the former Yugoslavia, and member of the expert group on the ICRC-sponsored Study of Customary Norms of International Humanitarian Law. He is deputy editor-in-chief of “Moscow Journal of International Law” and has written extensively on international legal matters related to peace and security.

**Emmanuel TRONC** (France) is Senior Research Analyst at the Advanced Training Program on Humanitarian Action (ATHA) at the Harvard University Humanitarian Initiative. He focuses on field research and context analysis on humanitarian negotiation and access in numerous frontline contexts. He has worked in the humanitarian sector since 1996, with the main experience in conflict settings, medical and emergency humanitarian response, and networking and dialogue with State and non-State actors. In 1997–2016, he worked with “Médecins sans frontières” (MSF) as Head of Mission in several countries, including Liberia, Ivory Coast, Democratic Republic of the Congo and extensively in Afghanistan. In 2004, he joined MSF's International Office developing and leading Humanitarian Diplomacy initiatives for its operations. He was also Humanitarian Advocacy and Representation Coordinator and represented MSF among major stakeholders in the international aid system, including political leaders and armed group representatives. Emmanuel leads the Humanitarian Access and Negotiations program at Conflict Dynamics International (CDI) and is involved in professional development design, training, and teaching.

**Anastasia KUSHLEYKO** serves as an International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) Regional Legal Advisor for the integration and promotion of international humanitarian law in Eastern Europe and Central Asia. She has worked for the ICRC Regional Delegation in Moscow since 2001 on issues of implementation of IHL at the national level and promotion of IHL among academia in the post-Soviet countries. In 2010–2013, she served as a Legal Director of the Russian branch of Stichting Justice Initiative (The Netherlands). She graduated from Tomsk State University in International Relations, with additional specialization in International Law, and earned two Master degrees — in International Peace Studies from the University of Notre Dame, Kroc Institute of International Peace Studies (2001) and in Advanced IHL and International Human Rights Law from the Geneva Academy of International Humanitarian Law and Human Rights (2007). Her research interests and publications focus on international humanitarian law, international human rights law and international and transitional justice

**Elizaveta GROMOGLASOVA** is a lead researcher at IMEMO's International politics department. She graduated from Moscow State University's Department of Journalism. She worked as a research secretary at the Center for situation analysis and in several capacities at IMEMO where she also earned her PhD in Political Science. She has authored several articles on human protection in armed conflicts, genocide and one-sided violence, as well as broader issues of international humanitarian cooperation. Currently she works on theoretical approaches to humanitarian aspects of global development and on her Dr.Sc. dissertation on "Humanitarian aspect of a state's foreign policy".

**Ramesh THAKUR** (India / Canada) is Professor at Crawford School of Public Policy, The Australian National University (Canberra) and editor-in-chief of academic journal "Global Governance" (2013–2018). In 1998–2007, he was Vice-Rector and Senior Vice-Rector of the United Nations University (UNU, Tokyo), since 2003 – as Assistant UN Secretary-General. He was a Commissioner and one of the principal authors of *The Responsibility to Protect* (2001), and Senior Adviser on Reforms and Principal Writer of the UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan's second reform report (2002). Prof. Thakur's books include: *The United Nations, Peace and Security: From Collective Security to the Responsibility to Protect* (Cambridge University Press, 2006), *Global Governance and the UN: An Unfinished Journey* (Indiana University Press, 2010), *The Responsibility to Protect: Norms, Laws and the Use of Force in International Politics* (Routledge, 2011), *The People vs. the State: Reflections on UN Authority, US Power and the Responsibility to Protect* (UNU Press, 2011), and *Theorising the Responsibility to Protect*, co-edited with W.Maley (Cambridge University Press, 2015).

**Alex BELLAMY** (Australia) is director of the Asia Pacific Centre for the Responsibility to Protect and Professor of Peace and Conflict Studies at The University of Queensland, Australia. He currently serves as Secretary of the High Level Advisory Panel on the Responsibility to Protect in Southeast Asia, chaired by Dr. Surin Pitsuwan. He is also Non-Resident Senior Adviser at the International Peace Institute, New York and Fellow of the Academy of Social Sciences in Australia. In 2008-2009 he served as co-chair of the Council for Security Cooperation in the Asia Pacific Study Group on the Responsibility to Protect. Dr. Bellamy is co-editor of the "Global Responsibility to Protect" journal. His recent books include *The Oxford Handbook of the Responsibility to Protect*, co-edited with T.Dunne (Oxford University Press (OUP), 2016), *Responsibility to Protect: A Defence* (OUP, 2014), and *Massacres and Morality: Mass Atrocities in the Age of Civilian Immunity* (OUP, 2012).

**Vladimir BARANOVSKY** is an academic director of the IMEMO's Centre for situation analysis and a member of the IMEMO board. In 1998–2016, he was IMEMO deputy director. He holds Dr.Sc. degree in history (1985) and is a full member of the Russian Academy of Sciences (2011). He is also professor at Moscow State Institute of International Relations (MGIMO-University) and was a visiting professor in several European universities. In 1992–1997, he led a project on European security at Stockholm International Peace Research Institute and is presently a member of the SIPRI Governing Board. He is a member of several think-tanks, expert and consultative councils, advisory and/or editorial boards of academic journals both in Russia and abroad. He authored and edited over 200 publications on European and international security, including monographs and chapters, such as *Russia and Europe: Emerging security agenda* (1997), *Regional security cooperation in the former Soviet area* (2007), *La fabrique de la politique étrangère russe* (2008), *International system: new realities in the making* (2014). His recent articles in academic journals include "From Kosovo to the Crimea" (2015), "Responsibility to protect: Russia's approaches" (2016) и "Russia's new foreign policy and its influence on the world system" (2016).

**Yevgeny PRIMAKOV** is director general and co-founder of NGO “Russian Humanitarian Mission” (since 2010) and author and anchorman of “International Review” weekly program (Russia24 TV Channel, since 2015). In 2011–2013, he was an advisor for UNHCR Turkey office on communication with refugee communities in cities of residence and, in 2014, worked as media and communications officer at UNHCR Middle East and North Africa Office in Amman. He graduated in history from Russian State University for the Humanities. In 1994–2011, he worked as a journalist, commentator and investigating journalist in various media (including “Kommersant”, TASS news agency, “Ekho Moskv” radio station, “Russian Newsweek” etc.). In 2005–2007 he was the head of NTV channel’s Office in Israel and Middle East and, in 2008–2011, led the Middle East Bureau of Channel One Russia. Since 2017, he has been advising Russia’s State Duma Chairman on international politics and humanitarian projects. He is also a member of the Presidium of Council for International and Defense Politics, secretary of the Russian Union of Journalists, and member of the Federal expert council on development of volunteer movement.

**Ivan KHOLIKOV** is a professor at the department of state law at the Russian Government’s Institute of Legislation and Comparative Law. He is also a legal adviser to the secretary general of the International Committee on Military Medicine (ICMM) and teaches ICMM courses on international law of armed conflicts. He holds the rank of Colonel (ret.), a Dr.Sc. degree in law and is a full member of the Academy of Military Sciences. He graduated from Military University. In 1992–2016, he served in various capacities in the Russian Armed Forces, including in conflict areas such as Angola, Kosovo, Chad etc. In 2014, he led the Ebola emergency response team to deploy Russian military field hospital in Guinea. He is an author of 90 publications on peace support operations, International Humanitarian Law, and international cooperation in the field of military medicine. He was awarded the Order of Honor and 12 medals by the UN, and Russian Ministries of Defense, Emergencies and Health.

**Denis SOKOLOV** is a sociologist and an expert on North Caucasus, with a focus on the informal economy of the region, land disputes, and institutional foundations of armed conflicts. He is research director at the Center for Social and Economic Research of Regions (RAMCOM). Since 2009, he has been a senior research fellow at the Russian Presidential Academy of National Economy & Public Administration (RANEPA). For over 10 years, he has conducted extensive field research in the Northern Caucasus, primarily in Dagestan, mainly on how globalization has transformed rural communities and led to new urbanization and migration patterns, the impact of the proliferation of Salafi Islam on local rural communities, and labor migration. His current research focus is on the migration of Russia’s Muslims to Turkey, Egypt, and Western Europe, and on the international circulation of foreign fighters from post-Soviet states. He is a winner of the 2013 Hadzhimurad Kamalov Prize, a Dagestani journalism award, in the “Consolidation–Creation–Tolerance” nomination.

**Oleg CHISTYAKOV** heads the Department of scientific-reference system at the Russian State Archive of Military History. He holds a Ph.D. in History; the topic of his Pd.D. thesis was “Organizational structure and activities of the Russian Red Cross during World War I”. He is the author of over 50 academic publications and has received “The Best Archivist of Russia” Award for 2015-2016.

**Elena KHARITONOVA** is a research fellow at the Sector of international organizations and global political regulation, IMEMO Department of International Politics. She graduated from the Russian State University for Humanities (RSUH) in 2000. In 2001–2014, she worked in Russian and international organizations, including a five year term as head of a unit at the UN Children’s Fund (UNICEF). She has professional experience in the areas of international development and humanitarian aid, social and cultural project and events management, security, international communications etc., completed a number of the UN professional development and education courses. In 2015 she joined IMEMO where she received her PhD in Political Science in 2017.

**Kira GODOVANYUK** is a Senior Research Fellow at the British Studies Center, Institute of Europe of the Russian Academy of Sciences.
